All inquiries for information and admission procedures should be directed to the Office of Admissions/Recruitment at MCC main campus **(480) 461-7600** (Southern and Dobson or the Red Mountain Campus at **(480) 654-7500** (Power Rd. and McKellips). Advisement is available at the main campus by calling (480) 461- 7200.

The deadline for submitting the application and all supporting documents for the fall semester program is June 1st. A minimum G.P.A. of 2.50 on a 4.00 scale is required for all courses that apply to the Associate of Applied Science degree in Mortuary Science.

Program Director: Dr. Thomas R. Taggart is a graduate of Worsham College of Mortuary Science. He is a licensed embalmer and funeral director with more than 45 years of funeral service experience. His Bachelor of Science degree from Aurora University has a major in biology and chemistry and a minor in education. His Master of Science degree from Northern Illinois University is in biochemistry. The Educational Specialist degree he earned at Mississippi State University is in vocational technical education and his Doctorate from Mississippi State is in Educational Leadership.

Clinical Coordinator: Donna G. Backhaus has more than 15 years experience in funeral service in Arizona. In addition to her Associate Degree form MCC in Mortuary Science, she holds a bachelors degree in Business Management and a Master's degree in adult Education Distance Learning from the University of Phoenix.

General Information:

Job Market: Good to Excellent according to National Studies. According to Government Studies, the Funeral Business is one of those Service Professions that will never be replaced by computers. On a National basis there are more jobs than there are licensed personnel to fill them – you may need to move to get the job, but the jobs are there.

What type of person becomes a funeral director? People from all walks of life enter funeral service – they are everyone – young, old – rich, poor – male, female. Age is an asset in funeral service and many retired police, fire and military personal become active members of the funeral profession.

State Requirements: The individual State requirements for entry into the funeral profession vary from state to state and from as little as a Certificate of completion to a four year Bachelors Degree.

The minimum credential for graduation from an American Board accredited school is the two year Associate of Applied Science degree – AAS. This is the degree that Mesa Community College offers. If a students is planning to attend MCC and comes from a state that requires two years of education plus mortuary science we recommend that the student complete the Associates of General Studies first and then with just an additional two semesters will complete the AAS degree and be licensable in all states having such a requirement. The states requiring two years of education plus mortuary science are: New Mexico, Nevada, Idaho, Nebraska, Iowa, Wisconsin, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Kansas, Montana, New Jersey, North Dakota, Oklahoma, and South Dakota.

There are currently only two states that require a Bachelors Degree, Ohio and Minnesota. If the student wishes to attain a bachelors degree, we recommend that the student complete our two year AAS degree and then transfer to ASU Polytechnic University right here on the Williams Campus and receive their Bachelors Degree with just an additional 60 hours of credit. This avenue allows the student to obtain an additional skill above the mortuary degree such as accounting, counseling, business management, etc.

It is appropriate to mention at this point that whether the students receives a one year certificate, an associates degree or a bachelors degree the amount of mortuary science course work is the same. The American Board of Funeral Service Education has in its required curriculum 52 semester hours of required mortuary science course work. The student receiving a 4 year degree will have no more funeral service education than the student receiving the one year certificate. With this in mind, it seems to be only common sense that a student wanting to obtain a higher degree would want that degree to be in another discipline giving that student a more advanced and well rounded education with additional skills.

Admission Procedures & Requirements

All Admissions Happens in the Office of Admissions – NOT in the Mortuary Science Program

1. An application for the Mortuary Science Program must be completed in addition to the MCC Student Information form. Application materials are available in the Office of Admissions/Recruitment on the Mesa main campus at Southern & Dobson, phone # (480) 461-7600 or MCC at Red Mountain, phone # (480) 654-7600
2. Completion of all prerequisites is strongly recommended.
3. Courses needed to meet the A.A.S. (Associate of Applied Science) degree in Mortuary Sciences must reflect a minimum G.P.A. of 2.50 to be considered for the program.
4. Students are admitted to the program each fall semester. **Applications, official transcripts, and all supporting documents must be submitted to the Office of Admissions/Recruitment by June 1st. Official Transcripts must be mailed to MCC by the college or university directly.**
5. Applicants will be selected ONLY if the file is complete.
A complete file includes the following:
 - a. Student Information Form
 - b. Mortuary Science Application
 - c. Official college transcripts
 - d. Official Mortuary Science school transcripts (if applicable)
 - e. Proof of immunization/vaccine requirements

Procedures for Student Compliance with Proposition 300:

The Maricopa Community Colleges have announced the procedures they are using to comply with Proposition 300.

The Colleges' efforts to comply with the law mean that students are being asked to provide information about their citizenship or legal status. To qualify for in-state tuition and financial assistance, students must provide documentation as proof of residency. Acceptable documents include a birth certificate, an Arizona driver license or ID card issued August 1, 1996 or later, and official immigration papers. Students who successfully complete the federal Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) will not need to show additional proof of citizenship.

Proposition 300, passed by Arizona voters in November 2006, stipulates that college students who are not legal United States citizens or are without lawful immigration status must pay out-of-state tuition, and that persons who are not United States citizens and who are without lawful immigration status are not eligible for financial assistance using state money. The law requires that those who are not citizens or legal residents pay out-of-state tuition, which now is \$96 per credit hour for students taking fewer than seven credit hours and \$286 per credit hour for students taking seven or more credit hours. The in-state tuition rate is \$71 per credit hour.

Acceptance Procedures

1. Applicants accepted into the program will receive the following:
 - a. Either a conditional or an unconditional letter of acceptance. The conditional letter will stipulate the necessary procedures prior to enrolling.
 - b. Disclaimer form to be completed and returned prior to enrolling.
 - c. An Advisement/Registration form with the approved classes for enrollment.
2. Applicants who are accepted and fail to enroll or pay all necessary fees by the due date indicated on the billing statement will forfeit acceptance into the program.

General Information

1. The Williams Educational Center offers on-campus housing for students. See attachment for information, or call (480) 727-1700. There are no dormitory facilities on the MCC main campus. Housing and transportation arrangements are the student's responsibility.
2. **The student shall be responsible for their own transportation to various clinical sites.**
3. It is essential that Mortuary Science students be able to perform a number of physical activities in the clinical/lab portion of the program. At a minimum, students will be required to lift human bodies, stand several hours at a time, and perform bending activities. The clinical/lab experience also places students under considerable mental and emotional stress

as they undertake responsibilities and duties in embalming human bodies. Individuals should give careful consideration to the mental and physical demands of this program prior to making application.

4. Advanced placement of courses must be evaluated on an individual basis.
5. **Special fees:** MSP 202 - Embalming (fall semester) \$500.00; and MSP 207 - Restorative Art (spring semester) \$500.00.
6. **Tuition:** In addition to the special fees, General Tuition for County Resident: \$71.00 per credit hour; Out-of-State: \$286.00 per credit hour. (Subject to change without notice).
7. The Mortuary Science Program is a total educational experience covering all aspects of funeral directing, embalming, and funeral home management. This is a block program, and the second year of the Associate of Applied Science degree. Every student must take the National Board Examination as a requirement for graduation. The cost of that exam is the responsibility of the student. Any students who has not taken the National Board Examination within one year of the date of completion of the required course work, will be required to re-apply for graduation and pay the additional fees necessary.

Admission to the Mortuary Science Program is selective. The candidate must have completed all prerequisite courses and maintained a G.P.A. of 2.50 or better. Application must be submitted by **June 1st** of the year for admission in the fall semester. HEPATITIS VACCINE REQUIREMENT

Documentation of Hepatitis B vaccine immunization series: Mortuary Science students must have received the final immunization prior to starting in the Mortuary Science Program.

General Information:

Hepatitis B is a viral infection caused by Hepatitis B virus (HBV). Individuals who work in medical settings are more at risk than others for acquiring this infection. Because of this increased risk, the Mortuary Science Program requires that students entering their program receive the hepatitis vaccine as a protective measure. A high percentage (85%-95%) of healthy people who receive two doses of the vaccine and a later booster achieve high levels of antibody development (ant-HBV) and receive protection against Hepatitis B. Full immunization requires three doses of vaccine over a six-month period. The duration of immunity is unknown, and it is recommended the immunization process be on a ten-year cycle. The incidence of side effects is low; however, **pregnant women should check with their physician before receiving the vaccine.**

You may obtain the vaccine series from any of the following agencies. Some agencies may have payment schedules, and you may wish to check with them regarding their payment policies.

WILLIAMS CAMPUS HOUSING AND RESIDENTIAL LIFE

Eligible Students: Serving students at ASU Polytechnic, Chandler-Gilbert Community College and other Maricopa County Community Colleges. Residing on campus is about more than just having a place to stay: it's about finding a place to LIVE! You'll invest thousands of dollars in your education in tuition, books and fees. As a result of these investments, you'll gain a new range of career options after graduation. Living on campus is a similar sort of investment. The friendships you'll make. The additional opportunities of interaction with faculty, the convenience of being walking distance from classes – all contribute to the value-added experience of living on campus. Few choices you make in college can offer so much in enhancing your college experience as living on campus.

Student status and eligibility to remain in residential living will be verified during each academic semester. To remain eligible for housing, students must be enrolled throughout the term and must be making consistent progress toward a degree. When a student withdraws or is withdrawn from a class for any reason, it is the student's responsibility to inform Williams Campus Housing. Falling below the 6 credit minimum could result in the termination of the License Agreement.

Housing for single students is sorted into two groups: traditional-age freshmen (18-19, recently graduated from high school) and all other single students. Freshman housing is separate from the rest of single student housing in order to meet the unique needs of students as they transition into college life. Housing for other single students is provided in two areas. Our North Residence Halls are composed of a cluster of five residence halls on the north part of campus. Alternatively, houses, which can be shared by two or three students, are available on the south part of campus.

Housing for students with families is available in three separate villages on campus. Houses range in size from 2-5 bedrooms and include internet, cable television and water. Community playgrounds and picnic/ BBQ areas are located in South and North Desert Village. Faculty and Staff of ASU and the Maricopa County Community Colleges are also eligible to reside in family housing.

WILLIAMS CAMPUS HOUSING

Williams Campus Housing is located at 5931 S. Sterling Mesa, Arizona 85212. Williams Campus Housing is located in the Student Union annex (enter the parking lot from campus Loop North)

Family homes are available from 2 Bedroom to 5 Bedroom at rents ranging from \$680.00 up to \$1075.00 per month. Shared house rents range from \$3,330 to \$4,491 for the academic year and residence halls from \$4,275 to \$5,220 for the academic year.

Shared house and residence hall rates do not include an activity fee of \$15 per license which is used for community activities and programs. Prices are per person.

Family housing rates do not include an Activity Fee of \$35 per license.

Family housing rates stated include water, cable TV, and garbage service. Residents are responsible for gas/electricity and telephone service.

The Villages, like all other housing areas, are staffed by Community Assistants (CA's) who provide peer support, policy enforcement and programs/activities for residents.

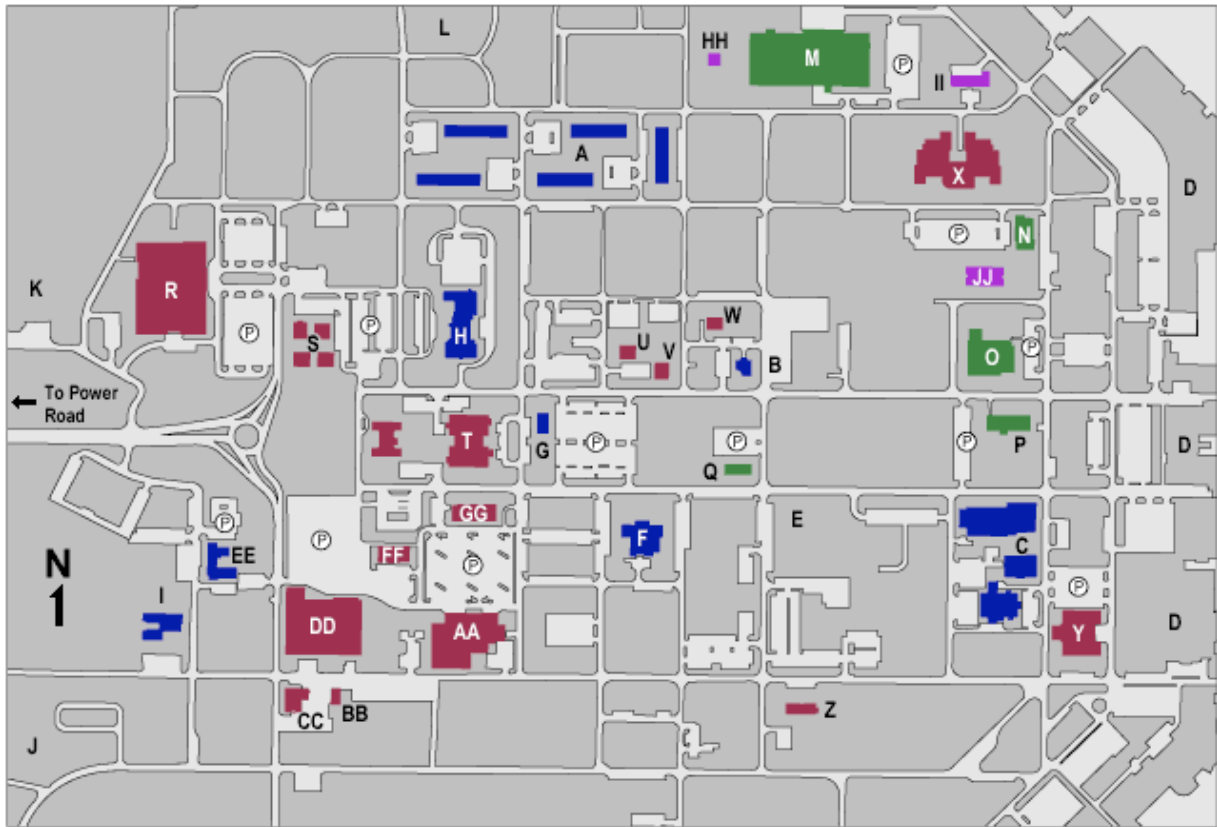
