





Finding Identity in Verse: Marcus Campbell's Voice is Heard Through Creative Writing

Marcus Campbell learned to mine his experiences during the pandemic in 2020, along with the country's ongoing social and racial unrest, for his first published book of poetry as a Mesa Community College (MCC) Creative Writing student.

His fall 2022 book tour for *My Identity as a Stereotypical Side Character* concluded with The Identity Tour Showcase at Mesa's Nile Coffee Shop following the Mesa Book Festival on December 17, 2023.

The book came to fruition while studying in the MCC Creative Writing Program. "The cornerstone pieces of the text were written during my time in the program with much of the supplemental material coming about during the COVID lockdown," Marcus explained. "A lot of the social and racial unrest provided me with the motivation necessary to complete the book."

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Marcus credits MCC for "helping me reach my career goals in almost every conceivable way. Foremost, they've helped me to realize my potential and make concrete steps toward fulfilling it."

Earning an Associate in Arts, an Associate in General Studies, and an Academic Certificate in Creative Writing in 2019, Marcus found that year to be a benchmark for his poetry in addition to his education. That year he received a second-place Vortex Award, a creative writing and arts publication produced in collaboration with Scottsdale Community College. Moreover, he was honored with a second place award for the Maricopa County Community College District (MCCCD) Artists of Promise Exhibition for his poem, "My Identity as a Stereotypical Side Character." The poem appeared in Passages, a collection of works by MCCCD creative writing program poets, fiction and non-fiction writers, screenwriters, and playwrights.

"MCC was an alluring place to study because of its accessibility– to teachers, administrators, and advisors," he explained. "It offered diverse opportunities and an engaged administration."

He credits Creative Writing Faculty Member Josh Rathkamp and Journalism and New Media Studies Program Director Nadine Arroyo Rodriguez with significantly impacting his education. "Mr. Rathkamp and the Creative Writing Program were fundamental in getting my writing to a publishable state. He also showed me in concrete steps how to take my ideas and turn them into published work." Marcus added, "Professor Rodriguez opened my eyes to what my creativity could do for me professionally. She was the first person to present artistic skills as professional tools, which helped me see myself not only as a creative but as an artistic entrepreneur."

Taking advantage of the social opportunities MCC has to offer, Marcus became the features editor of the *Mesa Legend*, the college newspaper, established the *Mesa Legend Podcast*, and performed his poetry at the annual MCC Festival of the Arts. He also was a proofreader for the Glendale Community College publication, *The Traveler*.

As his education progressed, Marcus became involved with the Green Flag Program, a partnership between the Mesa Chamber of Commerce and MCC, providing students with office space, business tools, and the resources needed to launch a new business venture in today's competitive environment. "It has been a great way to gain access to the means of production."

Marcus previously worked in the communications department at the Mesa Chamber of Commerce, where he was able to use creative skills in an environment that helped small businesses and nonprofits. He currently works in the marketing department at the Arizona Renaissance Festival. "I can use my creative skills every day in a fastpaced environment while spreading revelry," he says. Marcus also operates Desert Nights Media, a small business that provides social media management. On-campus activities are a cornerstone of life at MCC. MCC Performing Arts supported 132 events, performances, and staged rehearsals in Fall 2023 in MCC's premiere venues – the Performing Arts Center (PAC) and MCC Theatre. Over 10,000 patrons were served over the course of the semester.

We anticipate to more than double that in the Spring, with the potential to be hosting nearly 300 events, performances, and staged rehearsals. That's anywhere between 20,000 and 25,000 patrons before the month of July!

As our award-winning performances receive regional acclaim from the Region VIII Kennedy Center American College Theatre Festival, as well as the county-wide recognition from the AriZoni Awards of Excellence, spectators receive incredible value and quality in the performances at MCC.

iBelong Receives National Recognition with Prestigious Terry O'Banion Award

Our Summer 2023 issue highlighted the MCC iBelong Student Success Initiative, a common platform for teaching and learning using an iPad Bundle.

As a result of the program's success, MCC has been named a silver winner of the prestigious Terry O'Banion Award by the National Council on Student Development (NCSD) for iBelong. The annual award honors exceptional college programs throughout the United States for their innovation, impacting student outcomes based on clear data, responding to a significant need, and serving as a model of student development goals.



Patricia Herrera, MCC instructional technologist, who created, planned, and implemented the initiative in collaboration with Alvin Bridges, MCC's Chief Information Officer, accepted the award on behalf of the college at the 2023 NCSD National Conference held in October in Houston.

iBelong provides access to technology tools and resources to be successful. Students are provided with a bundle consisting of an iPad, keyboard, and Apple Pencil,

along with easy access to a robust technical support system. Since the program was introduced two years ago, it has proven to be extremely beneficial for students and faculty while demonstrating a cost-savings for the college. By the end of the 2022-2023 school year, 2,000 students were enrolled in the initiative. For 2023-2024 that number has risen to 4,000. An MCC poll found that 73% of these students are female with 53% having first-generation college student status. An overwhelming majority indicated that the initiative helped improve their learning and is aiding in improved course completion and retention.

iBelong also has support from the faculty, a major component in the initiative's success. Within the first sixmonths of the iBelong training period, participation rapidly grew from five faculty members to 50. By the end of the 2022-2023 school year, that number grew to 100. For the 2023-2024 school year, faculty participation is at 110 and continues to increase semester to semester.

"Winning the Terry O'Banion Award means we're changing education. It means we're impacting students and that's what we're here to do," Bridges says. "The coordination and communication between MCC departments has been paramount."

Herrera says student testimonials show "we are helping them feel like they do belong here at MCC. We're giving them the affirmation that they're doing the right thing by pursuing an education, by transforming their lives in their chosen professions. They feel that we value them."
