MCC Bridge Program Offers Paramedics Option to Become Registered Nurses

Many paramedics have the background and experience necessary to become a nurse. Some are choosing to expand their education by enrolling in the Paramedic to Registered Nurse (RN) Bridge Program at Mesa Community College.

This tailored program allows paramedics to fast-track their education to become qualified as an RN in two to three additional semesters. By building on their existing skills, Paramedics can eliminate repeat content and coursework they have already mastered.

Kristen Minnick, a 2012 MCC graduate, benefited by completing the program. Prior to coming to MCC, Kristen worked as a full-time firefighter/paramedic for the City of Goodyear. She would work 48 hours and then had 96 hours off on a continuous rotation every week.

When asked why she chose to complete this program, Kristen explained, "The main reason I chose to complete the Paramedic to RN program was because it condensed Block One and Two from 32 weeks to 12 weeks. With this course being offered at an accelerated pace, I was able to successfully complete it over the summer of 2011 and then jump right into Block 3 in the fall semester of 2011 at MCC. This cut down the extra amount of time I would have to spend going to school as well as taking time off from my full-time job."

Kristen was mostly drawn to the program because of the online availability. She stated, "I am a very self-motivated person and this was the perfect way for me to complete this part of the program. It helped eliminate a lot of time driving to and from school."

There were sacrifices that Kristen had to make to accomplish her goal of becoming a RN. In addition to taking vacation time from work and trading shifts, she had a 75 mile commute, one way, from her home to her clinical site at Banner Baywood Hospital. With clinicals every Thursday and Friday, she would stay in the hotel which meant she was away from her family.

"I committed myself to staying at the Best Western Inn and Suites every Thursday night so I wouldn't be driving back and forth so much. Also, every other Wednesday I had to be on campus for

the day to take an exam and to complete lab skills. Therefore, I also stayed at the hotel on Wednesday nights to cut down on the hours I would be wasting driving. I felt like this was going to be the only way for me to make this program successfully work for me. My husband was a very big help throughout this entire program because he knew I was spending so much time studying the material and going to classes and clinicals that I wasn't able to do my part around the house. He took over all the responsibilities around the house and was able to help me out with some of my trades at work too."

Kristen's paramedic training provided a strong foundation but she admits there were some nursing skills that were new. "I thought the questions on the exams were a lot harder than what I had experienced before because they were more geared to what the NCLEX exam was going to be like. Also, I had to change the way I would answer the nursing questions and learn how to study differently in the nursing program compared to when I obtained my paramedic license."

The sacrifices and commitments have paid off for Kristen. She continues to work as a full-time firefighter/paramedic for the City of Goodyear and was recently hired for a part-time Emergency Dept RN position at West Valley Hospital.

Dean Yohe says there are three reasons that online learning is becoming a significant option for students: "flexibility, flexibility, flexibility". If flexibility is what many of our students need, then it is up to us to provide high-quality online education opportunities for them.

We face some challenges. All new efforts do. We know there is a significant gap between student retention online and the traditional face-to-face option. We are working on decreasing that gap.

Zahid Arab of NBC's KING 5 News in Seattle is known as a compassionate reporter who gets the big story by gaining the trust of those he interviews. He provides crime victims and their families the opportunity for their voice to be heard.

Arab, who graduated from Mesa Community College in 2004, credits his experience at MCC for teaching him the interpersonal skills he uses in his job today. He said Duane Oakes, MCC's Chapter Advisor of Phi Theta Kappa, and other instructors helped nurture his potential and provided him with valuable experiences.

"Without Duane and other teachers reaching out every day in classes, I don't think I'd be where I am today," Arab said. "The leadership and confidence I gained in PTK catapulted me in my career."

During his time at MCC, Arab majored in journalism and wrote for the Mesa Legend. He worked as a counselor in Multicultural

Services and served as a PTK Regional President and International Vice President. After graduating from MCC, he earned a degree in Journalism and Mass Communication from Arizona State University.

Directly out of college, he covered the presidential candidates during the 2008 Iowa Caucus as a reporter at KCAU. He interviewed Barack Obama, Hilary Clinton and John Edwards, among others. Arab said his ability to feel at ease with the political heavy-hitters came from his experience as a PTK officer.

"Speaking to people, asking questions, researching topics, all of that helped me as a reporter," Arab said. "I felt leaps and bounds above others who had just graduated. I always wanted to be a reporter, but I don't think I'd be as successful."

Arab was awarded an Iowa Associated Press Award for uncovering a flaw in a local sex offender law. He went on to report the news in Honolulu and Las Vegas and now works as a general assignment reporter in Seattle. On a recent visit back to MCC, Arab helped PTK students kick off their C4 College Completion signature wall and reminisced about his time at MCC.

"For me, it was not just a campus, but a culture of success," Arab said. **"At MCC, you're not just a number; you're someone that faculty and staff really want to teach."**



MCC Employee Takes a Shot at The Impossible Project

Neal Winter is not a mainstream modern photographer. He creates images by using plastic toy cameras that leak light, resulting in highly original images when printed. Winter's unusual artistry is based on educated guessing and experimentation.

A few years ago, Winter followed his passion for experimentation and became involved in an effort called The Impossible Project. As a result, two of his photos recently appeared in a New York photography exhibit.

"It was pretty exciting to learn my work would be in the exhibit," said Winter, who works as a photo and computer technician at Mesa Community College. "There are only 12 photographers in the show with only a couple of images from each person. Just to have the opportunity is great."

The Impossible Project started with a small team of former Polaroid employees who shared a passion for reinventing instant film. In October 2008, when Polaroid closed its factories, the team saved the last Polaroid production plant in Enschede, Netherlands. Because the original Polaroid dyes were no longer available, they had to start from scratch and invent totally new instant film materials (one of the reasons for the name, The Impossible Project).

Winter assisted in the efforts from the beginning, taking photos from his location in the Southwest to test the new film materials. Hundreds of other photographers from different locations around the world conducted similar tests. Winter was one of the only photographers in the project from the Southwest, allowing for testing to take place in the unique climate conditions here.

Then, a few months ago, Impossible released their first 8 x 10 film to these test photographers. Winters acquired the film and was asked to submit photos for the exhibit.

"I've gotten to know these people over the last 2 years by talking to them over the phone," Winter said. "It's nice they noticed me. Their product lends itself very well to my style of photography."

ALBRIGHT COLLEGE OFFERS SCHOLARSHIPS TO MCC ALUMNI

Albright College, one of MCC's newest partners, launched an accelerated degree program at its Mesa location this September. Program participants can complete a bachelor's degree in approximately 24 months. To sweeten the deal, Albright is offering a \$2,500 scholarship to all alumni who hold an associate's degree from MCC or any other Maricopa Community College.

The accelerated degree program is designed for working adults ages 23 and up. All programs consist of 16 courses that meet one night a week for two years. A cohort learning style offers a group of students the opportunity to begin a course of study together and continue until their degree is completed, providing support and encouragement along the way.

Programs available in Mesa are Applied Psychology, Business Administration, and Information Systems. With a new cohort starting every 5-6 weeks, students can begin any time during the year.

Albright College is based in Reading, Pennsylvania. They began offering the accelerated degree program in Pennsylvania in 1997, and 88% of the students who begin the program successfully complete it. Albright opened its Mesa program this fall, and is one of several new colleges participating in the City of Mesa's initiative to bring more higher education options to the region.
