Two Arizona professors are recipients of <u>Arizona Council on Economic</u> <u>Education</u>'s (ACEE) Economic Education Leadership Awards.

Dr. Amy S. Cramer, an economics professor at <u>Pima Community</u> <u>College</u>, and **Debbie Henney**, an economics professor, and director of both the honors program and Center for Economic Education at <u>Mesa</u> <u>Community College</u>, are being recognized by Arizona teachers for
