MCC Theatre captures eleven 'Zoni nominations

Earning a nomination for one of Arizona's highly coveted ariZoni Awards is an achievement marking theatrical excellence. This year MCC's Theatre earned 11 such nominations.

The Miser, produced in October 2001, took six of the 11 nominations, including one for "Overall Production."

Lyn Dutson (faculty director of Theatre) was nominated both for her work as "Director" of the comedy and for "Costume Design." Jon Valpey, Fine Arts-Set Design coordinator, was nominated for "Lighting Design."

Students nominated for their roles in *The Miser* were Eric Gaede, "Actor in a Major Role"; and Jeff Phillips, Sean Kirsch, and Maria Escalier, "Hair and Makeup Design."

"Judging is competitive and rigorous," Dutson said. "Five judges review each show to determine outstanding quality according to their criteria. Judges are all theatre people, trained by the 'Zoni organization.'" She added, "Just being nominated is an honor. It's recognition for the excellence of work that we've been doing since the MCC theatre building opened in 1978. The 'Zoni organization is important to the Valley. It has brought the quality of theatre up—challenged us to be better."

MCC is the only community college in the state to participate in the competition and 2001-2002 was its fourth season to do so. Colleges and universities are evaluated in the "Non-Contracted Theatre" category. Professional Theatre and Children's Theatre are the two other 'Zoni categories. 

The hands of time: MCC's alumni clock tower

Any newcomer to MCC at Southern and Dobson will notice the enormous clock tower in the center of campus. In fact, it is often pointed out to visitors as a landmark for giving directions. The clock tower has graced MCC's Southern and Dobson campus for over 10 years and symbolizes MCC's lifelong connection to alumni.

The purpose

In the 80s, students determined that the Southern and Dobson campus needed a focal point, and a 56-foot clock tower that can be seen from almost any point on campus fit the bill. According to former Dean of Students Kaye McDonald, "The center of campus was thought to need a defining statement to identify the student area and to give directional assistance for students seeking the many services available to them."



Dedication to alumni

In October 1990 the clock tower was dedicated to MCC's alumni during Homecoming activities. McDonald said the clock tower was dedicated to alumni "to acknowledge and express appreciation for their continued support of MCC and to ensure that the students feel a continuing tie to the college." A bronze plaque on the front of the tower reads:

"This clock tower is dedicated to the Alumni of Mesa Community College. You will always be more than former students. You are our special friends. October 18, 1990."

A new look

During the 1998-99 school year, students felt that the clock tower not only was a focal point of campus but also symbolized Mesa Community College and should have MESA prominently displayed on it. Then president of

MCC's Student Government, Jared Langkilde, worked with Dr. Christiansen, president of MCC, to add the word MESA vertically to the clock tower's base on the north and west sides.

Tower facts

- Clock tower height – approximately 56 feet.
 - Tower base – 43 feet.
 - Clock unit – approximately 13 feet.
- Each of the four clock faces are 7-foot-square.
- All four faces of the clock illuminate at night.
- The bell tolls every hour. Five minutes after the hour, a brief musical selection is played.
- The tower's bells are programmed through a seven-disc digital CD player. Solid-state amplifiers attached to weatherproof speakers ensure that the toll of the clock tower and its musical selections can be heard across campus. ♦

MCC Offers New Opps in Nursing

In a creative effort to answer Arizona's critical need for nurses, MCC's School of Nursing is poised to offer three new programs to entice people into the profession:

1. English as a Second Language (ESL) Certified Nurse Assistant
2. Fast-Track Evening
3. Registered Nurse Refresher

Nurse Assistant candidates study in Spanish

In January 2003, MCC will launch a Certified Nurse Assistant program for people whose primary language is Spanish, but who also have some proficiency in English. This program creates an opportunity for nontraditional students to gain entry into the healthcare industry and offers an avenue for gaining self-sufficiency and a better-paying job. It also responds to Arizona's dire shortage of Spanish-speaking healthcare professionals.

Fast-Track evenings to jumpstart your nursing career

Designed for people who want to move quickly into a nursing career, the Fast-Track Evening program can make it happen in 16 months.

This program is designed for 20 students who wish to take only night courses. The group that started this program in August 2002 will be the first class to complete

the intensive course of study. They will graduate in December 2003 with the traditional pinning ceremony.

Online refresher brings RNs back to nursing

The first of its kind in the western United States, MCC's online RN refresher course appeals to the 10 percent of Arizona's registered nurses who are currently unemployed but considering a move back into their profession. The Internet course is especially enticing to RNs who live in rural areas with no nearby college or university that offers a refresher.

MCC's new online course makes the return to nursing an easy one: Nurses work from their home computers and practice in their own hometowns. The first semester course is "theory" and the second is "clinical," where the student works with an RN preceptor in a hospital or other healthcare facility located near the student's home. classes last year with fewer than a dozen students, hoping to entice 20 into the program by Fall 2002. Denise exceeded her goal by more than double; she now has 48 students.

"As time goes by," Denise said, "the IGC is expected to act as a catalyst, encouraging other bioindustry to the Valley. As bioindustry grows, we will have more and more opportunity to modify our program to reflect their unique employment demands."


Homecoming 2002
