three primary assessment areas: general education, career and technical education and developmental education.


Assessment allows faculty to document the impact that the MCC college experience has on student learning and to use the results to improve programs. Assessment is a catalyst for faculty to reflect upon how and what they teach and to have dialogue about learning across disciplines. Assessments are conducted each spring during Assessment Week (this year, Feb. 25 through March 1).

Faculty members can become involved in a number of ways. They can join the Student Outcomes Committee (SOC), the Program Review Subcommittee of the SOC, or a faculty cluster working on a particular outcome area, such as diversity or information literacy. Faculty members can also volunteer a class period for assessment each spring during Assessment Week.

An Arizona community college student will be named as one of the 50 New Century Scholars nationwide during the All-Arizona Academic Team luncheon at noon on Thursday, Feb. 14, at Mesa Community College's Kirk Student Center.

The All-Arizona Academic Team competition qualifies students for placement on the national All-USA Academic Team. The national competition is sponsored by Phi Theta Kappa, an international honor society for two-year colleges, USA Today, and the American Association of Community Colleges.

This year the highest ranked Arizona student will be named Arizona's New Century Scholar and receive an additional \$2,000 check from Coca-Cola.

Sixty-one students from Arizona's community colleges will participate in the All-Arizona academic luncheon. They have been ranked and placed on a first team, second team and third team. During the event on Thursday, the students will receive a certificate, a medallion and a scholarship check from their colleges. First Team members receive a \$1,000 presidential scholarship, Second Team members receive \$750, and Third Team members receive \$500.

Students selected for the All-Arizona Academic Team receive a four-semester tuition waiver from the Arizona Board of Regents to attend their choice of the three state universities.


The purpose of the All-Academic Team is to recognize scholarly achievements of students from junior, technical and community colleges. Students are ranked according to academic recognition, honors and awards, activities and leadership, community service and work experience, student essay, academic course rigor and letters of recommendation.

Students across the USA will be selected at the national level to make up first, second and third All-USA teams. Those who place as First All-USA Team members will each receive a \$2,500 scholarship.

Since its beginning in 1990, the national partnership between Phi Theta Kappa, USA Today, and the American Association of Community Colleges has provided international recognition and more than \$1.5 million in scholarship opportunities for hundreds of outstanding community college students and the institutions they represent.

MCCCD Seeks Best Innovations

The Maricopa Community College District and the League for Innovation in the Community College co-sponsor the Innovation of the Year Award program to recognize employees (an individual or team) who have designed and implemented a significant innovation that has had a positive impact on the education of students. Each of the criteria for the award has been tied to a Maricopa Value. One innovation is selected from each college, skill center, and the district office. A districtwide innovation is then selected to represent MCCCD at the national level. The districtwide winner will be presented with the Paul M. Pair Innovation Award, which includes \$2,000 to be used to further the winning innovation.

Recent outstanding MCC innovation nominations were the **Student Technology Assistant Program**, submitted for the 1999-2000 academic year, and the **MyMCC Portal**, submitted in 2000-2001.
