Status Report Confirms Red Mountain is Ready

For those who think Red Mountain (RM) is scrambling to finish construction, install phones and furniture, and hire more staff, well, think again. **Dr. Joseph Pearson** says MCC's new campus is ready to roll. Window blinds, carpeting, cabinets and countertops are installed. White boards, light fixtures, some furnishings, and even pull-down video screens are in place. Exercise equipment lines the wall in the fitness center. As you read this page, faculty and staff are adapting to their new offices and classrooms. Final paperwork is being completed for remaining teaching/staff positions. Doors will swing wide to welcome students on August 18, and a Grand Opening celebration is scheduled for October 3.

Southern & Dobson Remodeling Brings New Look

On July 16, faculty began moving into Building 5 (a.k.a. Anasazi or Media/Psychology). The new name for this structure is the Math/Computer Science Bldg.

Remodeling continues on the north side of the old Library. The Foreign Language lab will be completed on August 13, and the Copy Center will be finished on or around September 10.

Red Mountain Renovates Original Buildings

Dan Cook, project manager for Property Builders, said that renovation of the original Red Mountain campus buildings (on Power Road, north of McKellips) will be completed by August 2 (see Acacia Village on RM map, p. 4). Administration offices have been reshaped into a new

classroom; other new spaces include a Welcome Center, Student Services, and a lounge area. The exterior will incorporate features similar to those used in the new RM campus design.

All Roads Lead to MCC . . . Eventually

Nearly everyone knows that ADOT (Arizona Dept. of Transportation) is currently widening portions of the Superstition Freeway (US 60). The project includes additional general and HOV lanes, ramp improvements, and the widening of bridges over the freeway. To keep abreast of lane closures and roadwork that may affect commuters to the Southern & Dobson campus, please see ADOT's web site: www.supersititionfreeway.com.

For Red Mountain commuters, watch for orange barrels at the corner of Power and McKellips. Specific lanes may be temporarily closed to accommodate construction of a new Target store at the northeast corner of the intersection. Impact to traffic in the area is minimal.

RM Staff . . .

Team takes pride in shaping new campus

For four years they have operated from a small cluster of buildings on Power Road, but now the Red Mountain (RM) staff is packing up and moving to the new campus. Among the staff members are four women who have offered their talents and energy as they watched the fledgling campus grow into a viable educational resource for the community. They are Administrative Secretary **Yvonne Schmidt**, Enrollment Services Specialist **Helga Denison**, High School Project Coordinator and Career Services Project Coordinator **Rosemary Acosta**, and Administrative Secretary **Lyseth Mitchell**.

While Lyseth has been at Red Mountain from the beginning, providing support for the Services side of the administration, Yvonne came along a couple of years later to contribute

her skills on the Instructional side. "It has been really exciting helping to shape the development of the campus," Yvonne said. "I actually live in the nearby community, and I voted for the bond election when it was presented to the voters (in 1994). I was glad they were trying to build a campus in East Mesa."

Helga came to Red Mountain just three weeks after it opened, working in advisement, financial aid, assessment, and admissions. She can't wait to see the enrollment figures for the fall semester because she remembers when RM registered just 400 students in the first year. (Associate Dean of Instruction Joseph Pearson predicts that 4,000

to 5,000 students will be enrolled at MCC's new RM campus this fall.) "I really like working on a small campus," Helga said. "We get to know the students, and they come back and say thank you. We see them graduate and go on; they're like our own children."

In Rosemary's first couple of years at RM, her mission was to tell high school students about the new East Mesa campus. "It was an easy sale because the growth in the east is so tremendous," she said. "People want us, need us, and appreciate us, and being an MCC campus gives us credibility." Rosemary said she appreciates the working relationships with her colleagues at RM. "I like the way faculty and staff work together so closely as a team; we are all striving for the same goal." She noted that RM draws students from Apache Junction as well as mining towns like Superior, Globe, and Miami. "Whoever thought of building a college in East Mesa . . . it was a great idea," Rosemary said. "We are meeting the need."

RM Faculty . . . Educators welcome adventure, opportunities

Five MCC faculty members shared their thoughts on what it's like to teach at MCC's Red Mountain campus: **Gwen Argersinger** (English), **Richard Malena** (School of Education, Cultural Science Dept.), **Basil Al-Hashimi** (Economics), **Jim Giles** (Chemistry), and **A.J. Lombard** (Geology).

Q: Why did you choose to teach at Red Mountain?
 Gwen – It's the pioneer spirit! I like carrying the light into the areas needed.
 Richard – I like the smaller campus. It's a finished product that represents a lot of faculty input.

A.J. – One reason is convenience and economy—I live 10 miles to the east of RM.

Q: What are the advantages of teaching at Red Mountain?

Jim – There is a new attitude; it's a new adventure.

Richard – There is latitude in designing programs.

A.J. – Faculty, deans and secretaries are terrific—great support group. The traffic is easier. RM has an environmental bent, so it's a fun place to teach geology. The goal is to keep things natural, not to disturb the environment, though I do see Target from my window.

Q: What's the downside?

Jim – We have to break in a new facility, work out the bugs.

Richard – It's a challenge trying to build courses.

A.J. – We don't have a full range of courses yet.

Q: Are there noticeable differences in the student population? Do your students attend classes at both campuses?

Richard – There is no difference in night classes. There is not as much cultural diversity. My students are coming back to be teachers, so they are usually older.

Basil and Jim – Students attend both campuses. They are generally younger here, which may simply mean that we have not yet effectively targeted the older population. **A.J.** – A difference in the student population? That's a hard call; ethnically it's about the same. Definitely there are more students here who live in this area, and RM will probably pull a percentage away from the Southern & Dobson (S&D) campus as well.

Q: Does having two campuses make it more difficult to communicate and interact with colleagues in your departments?

Richard – The faculty at S&D do not generally want to come out here for meetings. There should be more give and take, especially since both campuses are considered to be equal. At the RM campus, we communicate with each other, regardless of department. We are all in the same office complex. We all have the same students.

Jim – It's harder to connect . . . distance is a barrier. It's nice because we can pioneer some things that we couldn't do as easily at S&D, which is a more traditional, conventional campus. At S&D there are patterns; here those patterns have not been set.

A.J. – At S&D, departments are located in all different places. Here our offices are all together. We get to actually know the professors in the different departments. That's not necessarily the case at S&D. At RM there are no political clashes; it is definitely a wonderful working environment, no ghosts yet.

RM Students . . . Boundaries blur between MCC's campuses

On a map we draw a circle around each of MCC's two campuses and theoretically define their service areas within a 6-mile radius. But interviews with students at the Red Mountain campus remind us that real people rarely fit neatly into circles on a map.

Six students were interviewed at the Red Mountain campus, and all of them live in the area. Four of them have attended both of MCC's campuses in the past. Two will be attending only one campus in the fall, three will take classes at both RM and S&D, and one will be traveling to RM, S&D, and Gateway Community College to attend the classes she needs. Two students said that RM's close proximity to their homes influenced their decision to enroll in college.


Additional comments offered by the students:

- ... Work location, as well as home location, can affect choice of campus.
- ... Selection of classes is greater at S&D, but alternative schedules (like RM's classes on weekends) make college workable for busy lifestyles.
- ... Travel distance and traffic congestion are a consideration.
- ... One-stop enrollment is preferred; it is easier to register at RM.
