COMMUNITY ADVISORY GROUP MEETS WITH THE CHANCELLOR

MCCD Chancellor, Dr. Fred Gaskin, met with the Commission on Excellence on Thursday, Oct. 26, in the Reading Room of the Paul Elsner Library. He told the advisory group of community members in attendance that their continuing input is of great value to MCC.

Dr. Gaskin talked about the importance of recruiting new faculty for the colleges. He projected that 100 to 125 new faculty will be hired each year. He noted that the faculty will continue to represent the diversity of MCCD student population.

Dr. Gaskin also talked about the Maricopa Community College's districtwide strategic plan, which is in process now. The strategic plan, he said, will guide the next bond, which is anticipated in 2004.

Mesa Mayor Meets With MCC's Management Council

Keno Hawker, Mayor of Mesa, met with the College's Management Council on Thursday, Oct. 26. Mayor Hawker talked about Mesa's 30-person citizen task force created to give the City a vision of growth to the year 2025. He said Mesa's master plan will be updated, and the task force will look at land use, transportation, parks and recreation, and economic development. Mayor Hawker said the goal is to develop a plan that provides for a balanced and sustainable community.

Following a discussion time with Mayor Hawker, **Dr. Larry Christiansen**, MCC president, said the College will strive to be more participatory with the City. The president said MCC will strengthen the linkages with Mesa and create more opportunities to be inclusive and to develop a sense of ownership from the community for the College.


